Meet the Director



Hello and welcome to *Entry Points!* We're thrilled you could join us for an exhilarating evening of dance.

Entry Points is a contemporary modern repertory concert and RDC's traditional kickoff to the season. Each year, I curate choreographers with distinct and developed voices, whose perspectives and backgrounds weave together a concert of vibrant artistic breadth. This year, I chose to highlight

predominantly female choreographers who work on the cutting edge of contemporary dance, who emphasize creative process over product, and who bring collaboration and humanity into their work.

Tonight's performance features *four* world premieres, each of which was brought to life this season, in addition to the return of *deluge* by Rosanna Tavarez. Over the last three months, the company has fearlessly dived into new and intricate forms of dance, achieving a refined balance of athleticism and artistry. They continue to grow as a community of human beings who bring their whole selves to the stage - unapologetically, vulnerably, authentically. Tonight, after five years of growth, we are excited to share their work on COCA's Berges stage for the first time.

Tonight's dances are intended to spark curiosity, foster conversation, and fuel human connection. There are no "right" interpretations, only your own real responses. I invite you to come along for the ride, and delight in the knowledge that no two experiences of this performance will be exactly the same.

Emily Haussler
Artistic & Executive Director

Emily Haussler (she/her) is the Artistic and Executive Director of RESILIENCE Dance Company (RDC), founded in 2019 in St. Louis, MO. Her work centers on building healthier, more sustainable dance communities by equipping dancers with resources for their mental health, physical wellbeing, and artistic success. Haussler creates collaboratively, leaning into play, experimentation, and partnership to explore human phenomena and connect viscerally through dance. Her full-length choreographic works for the company include Falling Forward (2024), Come With Me (2023), All Times At Once (2022), Making Room (2021), and Stanzas & Sculptures (2020). Her notable short works have been shown across the Midwest in Missouri, Michigan, Tennessee, and North Carolina. Haussler holds a B.A. in Dance and Biology from Washington University in St. Louis where she was the recipient of the lan D. Cramer Prize for Dance (2018) and the Marcus Artist in Residence Award (2022).

Josiah Gundersen (he/him) was born and raised in Olympia, Washington and graduated from Webster University with a BFA in Modern Dance (2019). Since graduating, Josiah became a founding member of Resilience Dance Company and is going on his 5th season with the company. Josiah is an active choreographer, most recently creating a solo work for Big Plate Dance's "Half Baked", and is also a contributing dance writer for St. Louis Dance HQ.



Abbi LeBaube (she/her) began her dance training at Motion Express School of Dance at the age of four in St. Louis, MO. She graduated summa cum laude with departmental honors, receiving her BFA at Webster University in 2023. While at WU she had the honor to perform & study abroad in Accra, Ghana. She also performed in works by José Limón, Ballet Hispánico, & Abby Z and the New Utility. Abbi's choreography has been presented at ACDA's Gala concert and commissioned by Big Plate Dance. Kia Smith is a Chicago native and is the Founder/Director of Vision and Strategy for South Chicago Dance Theatre. Her works have been presented at the historic Auditorium Theatre of Chicago, the Harris Theater For Music and Dance, at Sons D'Hiver Jazz Festival in Paris, France, Art Ez University in Arnhem, Netherlands, in Bogota and Medellin, Colombia, Grand Valley State University, University of Wisconsin-Whitewater and others. 
